RECOMMENDATION:

- That the Board hears any evidence on the protests filed regarding selection of a contractor for the El Jaro Creek Cross Creek Ranch Fish Passage Enhancement Project.
- 2. That the Board consider any irregularities in the bid submittals, and if it chooses to do so, exercise its discretion in waiving any irregularities that it deems immaterial.
- 3. That the Board reconsider, if necessary, the award of the construction contract for the El Jaro Creek Cross Creek Ranch Fish Passage Enhancement Project and exercise its discretion in making a determination of which bid to accept.

DISCUSSION:

Four bids were received on June 12, 2009 from the following contractors: Lapidus Construction, Specialty Construction, Schock Contracting, and Pat Molnar General Engineering. At the June 22, 2009 Board meeting, staff recommended and the Board approved selection of Lapidus Construction, Inc. as contractor for the Cross Creek Ranch Fish Passage Project. Schock, as the low bidder, submitted a protest letter regarding the bid selection. Lapidus Construction also filed a protest letter stating that Schock's bid was non-responsive. The protest letters from these two contractors are attached for your consideration.

The bid amounts from each contractor were:

1. Lapidus Construction, Inc.

\$423,947

2. Schock Contracting Corp.

\$369,900

Because the project needs to be constructed this year and will take about two to three months to complete, and because completion of the project must occur before the rainy season begins, there is not sufficient time to start the bid process over again as a way of resolving the protests. We believe both contractors are qualified to construct the project based on the statements of experience that were submitted with the bids, and on staff's personal knowledge of other fish passage projects each company has constructed.

Bid Protest Letter For Comb Cross Creek Project

Dear Kate Rees,

Thanks for the opportunity to bid on the Cross Creek job. We are a local contractor that targets this exact type of fish enhancement job as our primary work when available. We have reviewed the bid documents from Shock Contracting provided to us by Tim Robinson and have come to this conclusion.

PLC, Inc., as the lowest responsive bidder who was informed by Comb that they were awarded the Cross Creek Project by the COMB board on 6/22/09, we are extremely disappointed in how this bid process is being handled. Shock Contracting was the apparent low bidder on the Comb Creek project however upon review of their proposal they are clearly non responsive and thus not the best choice or an option for this project. During the course of the last week we were expecting to receive the contract document based on the board's decision to award to PLC inc. Based on this expectation, we declined several job opportunities with conflicting schedules to the Cross Creek job. Once we were notified of the bid protest & subsequent retraction of award, it was too late to respond to the other jobs. Thus, our business will suffer greatly by this retraction of award to PLC, Inc. and subsequent award to a non responsive bidder.

It is clearly not our intention to burn any bridges or point any fingers by filing this bid protest. This is not our normal mode of operation. We feel we have been put in this position by the actions of others. Last year, when we bid on this job previously, we were recommended for the job by Comb staff. However, it was never awarded. At the time, I suggested the job could be modified to its present state at a substantial savings & get a better product which is where we are today. I clearly understand the scope of work required to perform this job. This knowledge is what our bid is based on. As anybody who has ever hired out work and taken the

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cheapest price knows, this usually comes with some consequences. When I see prices that are half of what the engineers estimate is, for core portions of the most important work, I would be seriously worried. This is a very sensitive job with very tight constraints on all fronts. The County of Santa Barbara bid out a very similar job this last summer and took the low bid. What they received was a mediocre job due to the fact that the contractor had zero experience creating a stabile creek bed that resembled a natural stream & did not have the money in the bid to spend the time required. Fish and game was very upset with the project. The enhancement of Fish habitat is something we believe in wholeheartedly and it is not just another project. It is a cause for us. Please review our reasoning for this bid protest.

Shock contracting was non responsive on the Cross Creek Bid for the following reasons:

#1 Shock Contracting clearly did not demonstrate through the submission of their experience statement that they have 5 years experience of performing fish passage & creek restoration work of the magnitude and scope on the Cross Creek job. Shock Contracting did not provide the information that was requested and required in the license & experience statement. Only two projects were listed that appear to remotely have anything to do with Steelhead and riparian restoration. Of those two projects listed, one was subcontracted to Allen Larsen and does not list an owner, date of completion, project year, and contact information as required. On the second project, Allen Larsen is listed as the client or owner. It does not say. No contact information is provided. Although Shock Contracting did provide numerous other job references, they appear to have no relevance to this project. I do not see how Comb could have verified the experience based on this lack of information and apparent lack of experience in the first place as much or all of the work was not performed by Shock by their own admission in the statements submitted. Of the projects submitted, I am familiar with the fish ladder they listed that was improperly constructed by Allen Larsen and had an illegal disposal of excess concrete on the bank of the creek. This does not appear to be a good list of experience conforming to the bid documents. If Shock planned to use Allen Larsen as sub for this project, he was not listed, which means if he is the one with the experience in fish passage work, Shock has zero experience listed for this job.

- #2 Failure to adhere to the bid document requirement that the plans shall be returned with the bid at the time the bid is turned in. Failure to turn in the plans constitutes a breech of bid protocol making the bidder non responsive. The plans not being turned in opens up the possibility that the plans used by the bidder were deficient and the bid may not be based on a full set of accurate plans. Had the plans been submitted per the specifications the agency could have confirmed that the bid was based on the correct plan & number of sheets.
- #3 The bid documents clearly stated that the bid did not have to be awarded to the lowest bidder even though this was the intent as long as the bid was responsive and of fair value. It was further explained at the job walk that low bid was not the deciding factor in bid selection. The bid was supposed to be awarded based on experience on comparable jobs & value expressed in the bid.
- #4 On 6/23/09 we were informed we had been awarded the Cross Creek job. We requested our bond documents be returned to us to start the bond process. Based on this notice of award we turned down several job opportunities that had conflicting schedules with the Cross Creek job. On 6/26/09, we are notified of a bid protest by the apparent low bidder. On 6/29/09 at 5:31 pm, we are notified that by a special board decision the board has changed their minds and will award to the low bidder.
- #5 We respectfully requested minutes for the board meeting related to this award and protest. We were provided bid documents from the low bidder but have not received the board minutes. We still require the board minutes to evaluate our Bid protest options.

Dear Das Williams:

As you may be aware a protest against the award of the above referenced project to Schock Contracting Corporation due to lack of experience has been filed. The position of SCC is that the bid protest has no merit and should be rejected. Therefore, allowing the award of the project to SCC without further delay.

By virtue of COMB inviting a select group of contractors because of known skills and past performance the issue of contractor acceptability has been settled prior to the project bidding. An unqualified contractor would never have the opportunity to submit a bid. COMB staff has repeatedly stated that both the first and second bidders have the necessary skills and experience to perform this project.

The specifications address the issue of bidder qualifications in section A2.10 titled "Qualifications of Bidders" and states that "Each bidder shall be skilled and regularly engaged in the general class or type of work called for under the contract." and that "Each bidder shall also have not less than five (5) years experience in the magnitude and character of work bid." In order to determine the acceptability of a contractor the Board must determine the "magnitude and character" of the work to be performed under this contract and the "magnitude and character" of the work previously performed by potential contractors as evidenced by the experience statement submitted with the bid.

The "magnitude and character" of the work to be performed for the Cross Creek project is relatively simple. The majority of the work includes excavation, placement of rock in the creek, mobilization and dewatering. As evidenced by the experience statement submitted with the bid, SCC has performed multiple projects dating back to 2001 containing almost the exact items of work to be performed at Cross Creek. Another important aspect relating to contractor experience is the ability of the contractor to demonstrate that they have the capacity to handle the unique aspects of performing public works type construction projects in terms of prevailing wage, bonding, insurance requirements, submittals and environmental concerns among others. The ability of SCC to handle all issues relating to public works construction is well established. The experience statement submitted with the bid includes years of experience with many different government agencies on a wide variety of public works construction projects ranging in cost up to two million dollars.

Schock Contracting Corporation's bid is in full compliance with the specifications as submitted, however the specification requires that the board go beyond what was submitted with the bid to determine the acceptably of a contractor. The specifications make it clear that "To determine the degree of responsibility to be credited to the bidder, the board will weigh evidence of the bidder's trustworthiness, as well as bidder's quality..." There is no way to determine "trustworthiness" or "quality" without some kind of personal knowledge of the contractor. COMB staff has made it clear that as a result of the performance on pervious COMB fish passage projects that SCC is fully capable in all aspects to perform this project. The specifications require the Board to use this information in forming their opinion.

If the Board has determined that the best and most efficient method of letting contracts is through a sealed bid type process you must hold up the integrity of the process by awarding the contract to the lowest responsible bidder. One of the best aspects of the sealed bid process is putting the contract out to bid and letting the contractors independently determine the best way to perform the work. The contractor that figures out the best, most efficient method of performing the project will have the lowest price. It is a system of bidding that has many advantages to all parties involved. However, if you award the contact to a contractor other then the low responsible bidder the whole concept of what you are trying to accomplish by having a sealed bid process is destroyed.

I respectfully request that the board reaffirm the award to Schock Contracting Corporation and direct COMB Staff to issue a notice of award as soon as possible. As stated in the specifications "The Board and the Contractor recognize that time is of the essence of the Agreement and that the Board will suffer financial loss if the Work is not completed within the time specified." As such I request that the Board not delay this decision until the next meeting on July 27, 2009, rather immediately make the decision in order to allow time for preparation of construction.

In closing, I would like to express the continued desire of Schock Contracting Corporation to participate in this project. If you have any questions or would like any additional information please feel free to contact me.

Per our telephone conversation and an email dated July 2, 2009 I understand that a protest against the award of the above referenced project has been filed due to lack of experience of Schock Contracting Corporation. After reviewing the contract documents it is obvious that the protest has no merit and should be immediately rejected. As such SCC remains contractually obligated to proceed with furnishing all the necessary documents and is awaiting notice of award.

By virtue of COMB inviting a select group of contractors with specifically known skills and past performance, the issue of contractor acceptability has been settled before the project went out to bid. In addition the specifications state "Each bidder shall possess a valid Contractor's License issued by the Contractor's State License Board at the time his/her bid is submitted... Each bidder shall also have not less than five (5) years experience in the magnitude and character of the work bid." SCC submitted evidence of project experience of like magnitude and character over a 10 year period and a variety of other public works projects ranging in price up to two million dollars. COMB staff repeatedly stated that both the first and second bidders are qualified to perform this project. There is absolutely nothing in the specifications that would allow for disqualification of SCC's bid based on lack of experience. It is somewhat ironic that the bidder protesting displayed less experience then SCC.

The specifications state, "The Board and the Contractor recognize that time is of the essence of this Agreement and that the Board will suffer financial loss if the Work is not completed within the time specified herein..." As such I request that COMB issue notice of award to SCC without delay to allow for the necessary preparation in order to begin construction in time to meet the project deadline. If you are not willing or able to issue a notice of award immediately I request a meeting with you and your legal council at the first available opportunity.

I am in receipt of your letter dated June 24, 2009 regarding the above referenced project. It is clear from the specifications that COMB has the right to reject any bid. My argument is that the board was not privy to important information while making their decision that would have certainly changed the outcome of the vote to reject Schock Contracting Corporation's bid. Although the board is acting within the law by rejecting SCC's bid the use of public funds, never the less, requires strict scrutiny. With such a large sum of money at stake I ask that the board reconsider their decision in light of additional information that I can and will provide.

It is my understanding that COMB staff considered both the first and second bidders to have furnished satisfactory evidence that they are qualified to perform this project and that the technical ability of either contractor is not in question. The apparent reason for rejecting SCC's bid was excessive change orders on the last project SCC performed for COMB at Quitoa Creek Fish Passage Project. I can provide undisputable documentation that all the change orders associated with the project were the result of incomplete plans and changes directed by COMB after the project was bid and are not changes initiated by SCC. For example, the plans and specifications specifically stated the project required 450 cubic yards of excavation and was bid accordingly. The actual project required 1,695 cubic yards of excavation. Many of the other items of work had similar discrepancies. Another example is that SCC was ordered to work twelve hours a day six day a week. The additional cost of overtime work was \$21,210.00. No contractor can absorb the magnitude of changes SCC was faced with on this project without additional compensation.

The bottom line is that if COMB is interested in eliminating changes and cost overruns proper plans and specifications must be provided to contractors prior to the bid. Pushing the responsibility of cost overruns and changes on to a contractor that has no control over the design or specifications and then penalizing the contractor for following orders is not the way for the board to solve the problem. In my biases opinion SCC performed the Quitoa Creek project extraordinarily well and went above and beyond what would normally be expected to provide a fantastic project in what otherwise could have been a disaster and huge embarrassment for COMB.

The board voted to pay over fifty thousand dollars more to the second lowest bidder to perform the exact same work that SCC, the lowest bidder, was willing to perform. Based on the information the board had at the time of the vote it is an understandable decision. However, to make an informed decision on rejecting the lowest contractor's bid, based primarily on a previous contract, more information is needed regarding the previous contract. Too much money is at stake to make this decision without considering all the information. At a time when there is a financial crisis at all levels of government decisions such as this must be given extra attention.

Assuming, the plans and specifications for Cross Creek Fish Passage project are complete and accurate there will be no change orders on the project. However, if the plans and specification are changed and major items of work are added cost overruns will occur regardless of the contractor performing the work. In all likelihood, if the board continues on its current course of action, and rejects SCC's bid at the completion of this project they will have absolutely nothing to show for spending an extra \$54,047.00

Schock Contracting Corporation continues to be very interested in performing the Cross Creek Project for COMB. As evidenced by the bid there is no doubt in my mind that SCC can give COMB the best project for the least amount of money. Again, I ask that you, as general counsel to COMB, encourage the Board to delay any further action on proceeding with this project until they can at least review my position and potentially save a significant amount of money.

As is clear from the notice inviting sealed bids, COMB reserved the right to reject any and all bids and after serious consideration, the Board determined that the second lowest bid was the bid that should be accepted based on that bidder's extensive experience in fish passage construction projects locally, their reputation, and their dedication to detail throughout the bidding process.

As is provided, in part, in Section A2.10: "It is the intention of the Board to award a contract to a bidder who furnishes satisfactory evidence that he/she has the requisite experience and ability, and that he/she has sufficient capital, facilities, and plant to enable him/her to prosecute the work successfully and properly, and to complete it within the time named in the contract. To determine the degree of responsibility to be credited to the bidder, the Board will weigh evidence of the bidder's trustworthiness, as well as bidder's quality, fitness, capacity and experience, including whether bidder has performed satisfactorily other contracts of like nature, magnitude and comparable difficulty and comparable rates of progress. If in the opinion of the Board, a bidder is determined not to be 'responsible', its bid will not be considered for award of the contract."

Director Hanson moved to approve the consent agenda with the changes to the minutes, seconded by Director Abel, passed 7/0/0.

4. Reports From the Manager

a. Cachuma Water Reports

The water reports prepared by Janet Gingras were included in the Board packet.

b. Operations Report

Ms. Rees highlighted the May Operations Report that was included in the board packet. Most of the activities conducted in May were related to post Jesusita Fire efforts.

c. MWD Purchase of CVWD Cachuma Carryover Water

A letter from MWD was included in the board packet advising COMB that MWD had purchased 600 acre-feet of CVWD's Cachuma carryover water.

d. COMB Operating Committee Meeting April 1, 2009

The agenda and minutes from the COMB Operating Committee meeting held on June 3, 2009 were included in the board packet.

e. Meeting with Reclamation at ACWA Spring Conference, May 20-22, 2009, Sacramento

Ms. Rees reported that she had met with Reclamation during the ACWA Spring Conference in May. Her discussions addressed the prevention of Quagga Mussels in Lake Cachuma and requested that Reclamation find non-reimbursable funds to assist the County with the ongoing cost of the inspection program. Reclamation agreed to look into this. She also reported on sessions she attended relevant to COMB interests.

f. 2008 Surcharge Accounting

The 2008 Surcharge Summary was included in the board packet. In addition to surcharge water available, about 4,782 acre feet have been used through June 2009 from Project yield to meet downstream target flows for steelhead.

5. COMB Capital Improvement Program

a. COMB Office Building Project

1) Presentation of Concept Drawings and Preliminary Budget Estimate from Peikert Group, Architects

Detlev (Detty) Peikert of Peikert Group, Architects presented the conceptual drawings for the proposed new COMB office building to the Board. Mr. Peikert explained that as the firm approached this project they made every effort to understand the COMB organization, consider the natural setting of the area, design with sustainability in mind, and of most importance, develop a practical and economical design. Their approach was to design a simple, economical building that would house all staff and meet all the necessary functions of both COMB and CCRB. He described the details of the conceptual drawings using a PowerPoint presentation, and said that he is working with a couple of contractors to provide a good preliminary estimate for construction of the project.

2) Reply Letter to ID No. 1

Included in the board packet was a letter from ID #1's President, Harlan Burchardi, concerning the proposed new COMB office building. Also included was a reply to that letter from COMB's President, Das Williams, and a copy of a draft Indemnification Agreement between ID #1, COMB, and the South Coast Member Units. The legal documents for the COMB Bond state that South Coast Member Units shall be solely responsible for repayment of the bond. The Indemnification Agreement is not necessary, but would give ID#1 additional assurance that it would not be responsible for repayment of any portion of the bond. ID#1 will consider the draft Indemnification Agreement and the COMB POS.

Goleta Water District's (GWD) legal counsel, Fran Farina, expressed her concern with the draft Indemnification Agreement relative to ID#1 paying for a portion of the proposed COMB office building. She referred to a separate agreement (noted in Mr. William's letter) to be negotiated with ID#1 on the sharing of the cost for a new office building. Counsel Hair explained that the Indemnification Agreement was meant only to address the COMB bond repayment responsibilities, and was not linked to any separate agreement with ID#1 for cost sharing of the office building. The Board requested that Ms. Farina discuss her issues with Counsel Hair.

b. SCC/Upper Reach Reliability Project

1) Receipt of Pre-Qualifications from Contractors

Ms. Rees reported that a notice requesting pre-qualifications from interested contractors for construction of the 2nd Pipeline Project was advertised in late May 2009. Eleven contractors submitted their qualifications for the project; a list of those contractors was included in the board packet. These firms will be ranked per COMB's Prequalification Policy and the five top-ranked

contractors will be requested to bid on the project. It is anticipated that a contract will be awarded by October 2009.

2) Recommendation for Construction Management Services

Ms. Rees reported that three engineering firms were pre-selected to submit bids for construction management services for the 2nd Pipeline Project. All of the contractors submitted responsive bids, and all have appropriate experience to successfully complete the project. After review by staff and outside engineers, staff recommended that AECOM be hired to provide construction management services for this project.

Director Lieberknecht moved that AECOM be selected to provide construction management services for the South Coast Conduit Upper Reliability Project, seconded by Director Williams, passed 6/0/1, Director Bettencourt abstained.

3) Authorization to Sign Right-Of-Way Agreements, Accept the Easement Deeds, and Authorize Payments into Escrow for Gessert-Brown and University Exchange Corporation

Ms. Rees reported that COMB's real estate consultant Hamner-Jewell and COMB staff have been in negotiations with the two landowners in the Glen Annie watershed that will be affected by the construction of the 2nd Pipeline Project. She reported that the negotiations have been completed, and a mutually agreed upon price had been accepted by each of the landowners, contingent upon approval by the COMB Board. At the April 27th Board meeting, the Board authorized the General Manager to offer financial compensation to the landowners. Ms. Rees requested that the Board approve the negotiated compensation to purchase temporary construction and permanent right-of-way easements to complete the process.

Director Hanson moved to authorize the General Manager to sign the Right-of-Way Agreements, accept the Easement Deeds, and authorize payments into escrow for Gessert-Brown and University Exchange Corporation, seconded by Director Lieberknecht, passed 6/0/1, Director Bettencourt abstained.

c. CIP Bond

1) Revised Schedule

Included in the board packet was the revised schedule for the various Member Unit meetings regarding the bond issuance process. Ms. Rees requested that everyone check the dates for their respective meetings and contact Janet Gingras with any changes.

Director Abel requested that the schedule be revised to clearly state the specific actions required from the individual Member Unit Boards during each scheduled meeting. Staff agreed to do so.

2) Informational Briefing on Proposed Cost Distribution Methodology for Bond Debt Service Repayment and Proposed Cost of Services Analysis

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Ms. Rees reported that at the May 18, 2009 Board meeting, President Williams, at the request of Carpinteria Valley Water District, agreed that the COMB Board should receive information and consider a different bond repayment cost distribution than the historic Cachuma entitlement percentages. At the June 3, 2009 COMB Operating Committee meeting this was discussed. Ms. Rees reported that the other General Managers did not think COMB should consider adjusting the cost repayment percentages of the bond in isolation. They recommended that if the COMB Board was interested in evaluating this issue, a comprehensive cost of services analysis should be done for the entire conveyance system, and that an experienced consultant should be hired to carry out this analysis.

Ms. Rees agreed with the recommendation of the Operating Committee; however she expressed concern that this type of analysis could be lengthy and would likely hold up the bond issuance. To avoid delay, staff proposed that an additional provision be included in COMB's Official Statement and the Joint Participating Agreements as drafted by bond counsel, Doug Brown, which would allow a change to the cost repayment distribution at a later time, if the Member Units decided it was appropriate. The Board was in agreement that including this statement was appropriate.

The Board also directed staff to provide an estimated cost to do a full cost benefit analysis in September after the bond was issued. Ms. Rees indicated that input would be needed from the Member Unit Managers to develop an appropriate scope of work to provide to qualified consultants in order to get a good cost estimate.

6. Proposed Final COMB Budget for Fiscal Year 2009-2010

Ms. Rees reported that there had been no changes to the draft FY 2009-2010 Budget presented at the May Board meeting. The COLA decreased from 2.5% to 2.4% and the budget now includes the approved salary increase for the General Manager.

Director Abel indicated that the Montecito Water District Board had several questions regarding the COMB budget, which she would provide to Ms. Rees and Ms. Gingras for follow-up.

Director Lieberknecht moved to approve the proposed COMB Budget for Fiscal Year 2009-2010 in the amount of \$3,365,727, seconded by Director Hanson, passed 7/0/0.

7. Consider FY 2008-09 Budget Adjustment for Erosion Control Measures and Fence Replacement at Lauro Reservoir Due to the Jesusita Fire

Ms. Rees reported that during the Jesusita Fire, approximately 36.8 acres within the fence line around Lauro Reservoir completely burned. She provided preliminary cost estimates for the items and activities that need to be addressed for recovery of the burned area. In order to move forward with the recovery activities, Ms. Rees requested a budget adjustment in the amount of \$375,000. Because some anticipated

project work for FY 2009 had not been completed, funds are available to be transferred from two capital project accounts into a Jesusita Fire account. Staff has applied for financial assistance from the California Disaster Assistance Act Program for tree removal and to the National Resource Conservation Service for erosion control measures. The Bureau of Reclamation has also been contacted to see if it has any funds available to replace the damaged fencing around Lauro Reservoir.

Director Lieberknecht moved to reallocate current fiscal year budgeted funds in the amount of \$375,000 to carry out erosion control measures, dead tree removal, and replacement of fencing around Lauro Reservoir caused by the Jesusita Fire, seconded by Director Williams, passed 6/0/1, Director Bettencourt abstained.

8. Recommended Contractor for El Jaro Creek Cross Creek Ranch Fish Passage Project

Ms. Rees highlighted the memo that was included in the board packet. Four bids were received from contractors bidding on the project. Staff recommended hiring Lapidus Construction, Inc. due to their extensive experience in fish passage construction projects locally. Even though Lapidus submitted a somewhat higher bid, staff was of the opinion that Lapidus had been the most responsive bidder, particularly by reducing their bid by about \$100,000 from the bid submitted last year for the same project.

Director Bettencourt expressed his concern about staff not recommending the lowest bidder for the project. He also objected to having COMB contract for a fish passage project that should be with CCRB. Ms. Rees explained that CCRB does not have liability insurance so COMB needs to be the agency to contract for construction of the fish passage projects. Mr. Bettencourt was of the opinion that COMB and CCRB should have an agreement for COMB to run the project instead of CCRB.

Director Abel moved to approve the selection of Lapidus Construction, Inc. as the contractor for construction of the El Jaro Creek Cross Creek Ranch Fish Passage Enhancement Project, seconded by Director Hanson, passed 6/1/0, Director Bettencourt voted no.

9. Quagga Mussel Issues

a. County Parks Department Long Term Funding Plan

Included in the board packet was a letter from Dan Hernandez, County Parks Department outlining County Parks plan for long term funding of the Cachuma Lake Quagga Mussel Program. This fiscal plan was required by COMB to be submitted prior to sending the one time contribution of \$60,000 towards the Quagga Mussel Inspection and Prevention Program. Ms. Rees reported that the check had been sent to County Parks.

b. Quagga Mussel Ad Hoc Committee Appointments

President Williams appointed Director Hanson and staff to the Quagga Mussel Ad Hoc Committee.

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This was deferred to the July meeting.

11. Directors' Request for Agenda Items for Next Meeting

There were no requests except to include the South Coast Conduit cost benefit analysis estimate for the September 2009 Board meeting.

12. Meeting Schedule

The next regular Board meeting will be held July 27, 2009 following the 2:15 p.m. CCRB regular Board meeting, at the COMB office.

13. COMB Adjournment

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 5:34 p.m.

RE: SECRETARY'S ANNUAL STATEMENT OF INVESTMENT POLICY

The following is my annual statement of investment policy rendered pursuant to Section 53646(a) of the Government Code:

- 1. Investment of sinking fund or surplus money of Cachuma Operation & Maintenance Board (*Board*) shall be made in securities in which the Board is legally empowered to invest such funds in accordance with Section 53601 of the Government Code, taking into consideration the probable income as well as the probable safety of said funds, exercising the judgment and care under the circumstances prevailing, which persons of prudence, discretion and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not in regard to speculation, but in regard to the permanent disposition of said funds.
- 2. As far as possible, all money shall be deposited for safekeeping in state or national banks or state or federal savings and loan associations or may be invested as provided in Section 53635 of the Government Code.
- 3. Money may be invested in the Local Agency Investment Fund in accordance with Section 16429.1 of the Government Code.
- 4. No investments shall be made in financial futures or financial option contracts which are otherwise allowed pursuant to Section 53601.1 of the Government Code.
- 5. All interest earned shall be credited to the General Fund.
- Accounts shall be established and maintained in Board accounting records to record surplus and inactive funds at all times in accordance with the State Controller's chart of accounts as authorized by Section 53891 of the Government Code.
- 7. Reserve Fund account balances shall be maintained separately and shall reflect at all times the balance in each reserve fund in a manner consistent with generally accepted accounting practices.
- 8. Depositories having custody of Board funds shall be directed to forward copies of all correspondence concerning Board funds to the Secretary of the Board.
- 9. Verification that monies have been on deposit at all times and collateralized in amounts equal to or in excess of funds designated by the Board of Directors as reserve funds shall be made in the annual audit of records.
- 10. After review and prior authorization by the Board of Directors, the Secretary should be delegated the authority and responsibility to invest or to reinvest funds of the Board or to sell or exchange securities so purchased in accordance with Section 53607 of the Government Code.
- 11. The Board should from time to time determine which reserve funds are surplus and which are inactive.
- 12. The Secretary shall render a monthly report to the Board in accordance with Section 53646(b) of the Government Code.

Operations Report – June 2009

Cachuma Project water usage for the month of June 2009 was 1,990 acre-feet, compared with 2,288 acre-feet for the same period in 2008. Cachuma Project water use for the 12 months ending June 30, 2009 was 22,523 acre-feet, compared with 28,762 acre-feet for the 12 months ending June 30, 2008.

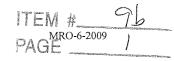
The average flow from Lake Cachuma into the Tecolote Tunnel was 84 acre-feet per day. Lake elevation was 741.36 feet at the beginning of the month and 739.90 feet at the end. Recorded rainfall at Lauro Dam was .4 inches for the month and 12.72 inches for the rainfall season, which commenced on September 1, 2008.

Santa Barbara wheeled 411 acre-feet of Gibraltar water through Lauro Reservoir during the month. 460 acre-feet of State Water Project water was wheeled through Cachuma Project facilities and delivered to South Coast Member Units during the month.

Conditions at Ortega Reservoir have remained consistent over the month. Weekly monitoring of drain flow and site conditions continued. COMB received a subpoena on June 12, 2009 requesting a massive amount of very specific information regarding Ortega and Carpinteria Reservoirs. The meticulous data collection effort has involved all COMB operations staff and is nearing completion to comply with the August 14, 2009 extended deadline.

Other activities conducted this month include:

- A mechanical flow meter in the Lower Reach of the SCC at the Lambert Road crossing was recalibrated and rebuilt to provide a higher degree of metering accuracy for Montecito and Carpinteria Water Districts.
- A meter audit was conducted of the Boundary Meter Totalizer in the Lower Reach of the SCC. Results show that the Boundary Meter is reading both east and west flow accurately at Net Full, and will continue to be audited for the next 6 months to monitor accuracy.
- 1000 ft of the Lauro Reservoir perimeter fence was replaced along San Roque Road at the main access gate. This first phase of replacement was implemented to repair damages occurring to that section of the fence before the Jesusita Fire.
- Monitoring of excavation activity around the South Coast Conduit continued at the Caltrans Hwy 192 drainage project west of Mission Canyon Rd.
- Progress continued on the 2nd Pipeline and Mission Creek projects. A complete status of the projects is included in the July 27, 2009 Board Packet.



Routine operation and maintenance activities conducted during the month included:

- Sampled water at North Portal Intake Tower
- Monitored conduit right-of-way and responded to Dig Alert reports
- Read piezometers and underdrains at Glen Anne, Lauro and Ortega Dams
- Read meters, conducted monthly dam inspections, and flushed venturi meters

2. Public Comment

There were no comments from the public.

3. Approval of Minutes, June 3, 2009

Eric Ford moved to approve the minutes for the April 1, 2009 meeting, seconded by Tom Mosby, passed 3/0/2, Chris Dahlstrom and Charles Hamilton were absent.

4. General Manager's Report

a. Status of Spill/Surcharge/Exchange Accounting

A letter will be sent from the South Coast Member Unit General Managers in response to a letter received from Best Best & Krieger on behalf of ID#1. This letter indicated a marked change in ID#1's position from the conceptual agreement reached by all the Member Unit managers. Tom Mosby will compose and send a response letter on behalf of the South Coast General Managers, disagreeing with the ID#1's stated position in the letter.

5. COMB Capital Improvement Program

a. CIP Bond Schedule

Ms. Rees reported that Janet Gingras is working on another revised schedule which will include clarifying language requested by Jan Abel regarding the specific approval steps the Member Units need to take in approving their Joint Participation

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agreements for the COMB Bond issuance. Ms. Rees asked Bill Hair if Member Unit approval of their Joint Participation Agreement was sufficient to meet the COMB JPA's ratification requirement. Mr. Hair indicated that it was acceptable to him, but advised staff to ask bond counsel, Doug Brown. He indicated that ID#1 would still need to ratify the COMB Board's action.

b. Draft Joint Participation Agreements and COMB's POS

Ms. Rees verified the dates and the approval/ratification process that each agency would be including on their respective agendas for their individual Board meetings.

c. Draft Indemnification Agreement for ID #1 for COMB Bond Issuance

Ms. Rees indicated that an Indemnification Agreement has been drafted to give ID#1 added assurance that it will not be responsible for any part of the bond repayment. It is currently between COMB, ID#1 and the South Coast Member Units.

6. COMB Operations

a. SCC Metering of Lower Reach

Mr. Mosby reported that MWD is waiting for a response from CVWD and COMB concerning his suggestion of using the Ortega South Flow meter as the billing meter for CVWD's Cachuma water use. Ms. Rees indicated either the Ortega South Flow meter or the Boundary meter were acceptable to COMB, but that MWD and CVWD needed to agree on which meter should be used.

b. Ortega Reservoir Leak

Mr. Mosby reported that progress is being made through the legal process. Ms. Rees reported that COMB received a subpoena for documents pertaining to Ortega Reservoir from legal counsel for Cushman Contracting. The reservoir is still leaking at approximately the same rate.

c. Jesusita Fire Activities

Ms. Rees reported on meetings with various agencies regarding damage and rehabilitation work being carried out as a result of the Jesusita Fire. COMB will be hydroseeding around Lauro Reservoir for erosion control, the damage to the core shed is being handled through COMB's insurance carrier, an arborist preparing a report on the damaged and destroyed tress around the Lauro Reservoir, and COMB has received an estimate for replacing the damaged security fencing around the reservoir. Ms. Rees also reported that COMB has applied to CDAA for disaster funding and that Reclamation has been approached to see if non-reimbursable funds are available to replace the security fencing

7. Cachuma Issues

a. USGS Stream Gauges

Ms. Rees explained that the USGS stream gauges being used to collect flow and water quality data for the mandatory long term fisheries monitoring program are currently part of the County Water Agency/Flood Control stream gauge program. This was originally done as a cost saving to CCRB. The County is trying to cut costs, and plan to take some of these gauges out of their program. Tom Fayram has also

indicated that he would prefer for CCRB to have its own separate program in future. Ms. Rees would rather add the fisheries stream gauge program to Reclamation's existing program because collection of the data it is part of the Cachuma Biological Opinion monitoring requirements. Preliminary discussions with Reclamation regarding this change were promising. If this shift occurs, the stream gauge program would be billed to the Member Units through their Cachuma water rates. The managers thought this was a good idea.

b. Scheduling of Cachuma Project Cost Benefit Analysis

Ms. Rees reported that the COMB Board agreed to consider hiring a consultant to do the analysis. Ms. Rees needs from the Member Unit managers a comprehensive list of all the components that they think should be included in the analysis in order to develop a scope of work and get a cost estimate to present to the Board at the September Board meeting. Ms. Bjork indicated a need to differentiate between fixed capital costs related to capacity, and variable costs related to water delivery. The City of Santa Barbara, Goleta Water District, and Montecito Water District are of the opinion that a comprehensive system-wide analysis needs to be undertaken - not just an adjustment of the bond repayment percentages, as suggested by Carpinteria Valley Water District.

c. Proposition 84 Activities

Ms. Rees reported that under Prop 84, IRWM regions must be accepted by DWR in order to apply for grant funding from Prop 84. Santa Barbara County submitted a region acceptance application to DWR, and Ms. Rees participated in an interview with DWR as one of the representatives for Santa Barbara County. She indicated the interview went well, and summarized the questions raised by DWR.

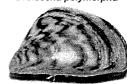

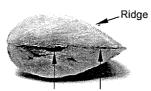

RECOMMENDATION:

- Consider Carpinteria Valley Water District's request to use a new cost sharing methodology developed by CVWD staff for repayment of the proposed COMB Bond issue.
- 2. Hire AECOM to develop a scope of workwith input from all Cachuma Project Member Unit General Managers, and carry out a comprehensive Cost-of-Service/Cost-Benefit Analysis for all Cachuma Project facilities, for a not-to-exceed amount of \$80,000.
- 3. Authorize the Cost-of-Service/Cost-Benefit Analysis to begin immediately after the COMB Capital Improvement Program Bond has been issued, with a goal of completing the analysis in six months.

DISCUSSION:

At the June 22, 2009 Board meeting, the Board received information and considered a request from Carpinteria Valley Water District (CVWD) to use a different cost allocation for repayment of the proposed COMB bond than along historic Cachuma entitlement percentages. Counsel Hair confirmed that COMB's Joint Powers Agreement does permit COMB to change allocation of costs if it so chooses, but not the water entitlement percentages.

Based on the discussion at the June 22nd Board meeting, it was apparent that the City of Santa Barbara, Montecito Water District, and Goleta Water District were not willing to evaluate a different cost share methodology for repayment of the bond in isolation, but were willing to consider a full cost of service analysis that addresses all of the issues affecting the distribution of cost to COMB Member Agencies

Therefore, after substantial discussion, the Board agreed with the Operating Committee's and staff's recommendation and directed staff to:

(1) Include an additional provision in COMB's Official Statement and the So	uth Coast
Member Units' Joint Participation Agreements, as written by Doug Brown, COMB's	
Counsel, which would allow a change to the repayment cost distribution at a later ti	me, if all
agreed it was appropriate to do so.	W 1-1-1-1

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(2) Provide an estimated cost for a consultant experienced in cost of services/cost benefit analyses to carry out a full cost of service/cost benefit analysis. This would not occur until September, after the bond was issued, to accommodate COMB staff's workload involving the bond issuance. Depending on the cost estimate, the Board would then decide if development of the study was fiscally warranted.

Enclosed is a second letter from Mr. Hamilton dated July 6, 2009 indicating that the CVWD Board is unanimously opposed to approving COMBs bond issue documents if the historic cost sharing methodology is used for bond repayment. They have requested that COMB adopt a new cost sharing methodology developed by Mr. Hamilton for the bond repayment only (also attached) to address the use of the Cachuma Project facilities to convey all non-Project water, namely State Water Project water, and Cachuma Project water. The methodology does not address use of the Cachuma facilities for other non-project water, such as ground water or reclaimed water.

To assure CVWD that COMB recognizes the cost sharing issues are important, staff is recommending that the COMB Board make a commitment to carry out the cost of service/cost benefit analysis, which will include consideration of the bond repayment cost distribution. I have received a very preliminary scope of work from AECOM for this analysis, with a cost estimæ of \$40,000 to \$50,000. However, there has been no input from COMB staff or from the Member Unit Managers. I would expect that once all components are integrated into the analysis, the cost estimate would likely double. AECOM has worked as COMB's consultant engineer for 12 years, and the firm is not empbyed by any of the other Member Units. AECOM knows the Cachuma Project facilities intimately through its development of theSCC Reliability Study and our Capital Improvement Program. They have technical and financial expertise to do this work, and I believe they can prepare an unbiased evaluation of the costs and benefits of all components of the system. Therefore, staff recommends that AECOM be hired to prepare comprehensive Cost-of-Service/Cost-Benefit Analysis for all Cachuma Project facilities, for a not to exceed amount of \$80,000. The following conditions would apply:

- 1. The scope of work would be limited to preparing a comprehensive cost of service/cost benefit analysis only. It would not commit the Member Units to any recommendations coming out of the study.
- 2. The work would not begin until after the COMB bond is issued.
- 3. A special assessment would be necessary as this work was not anticipated in the approved FY 2009-10 COMB budget. The consultant costs would be assessed to the South Coast Member Units using current entitlement percentages.

Goleta Water District - 40.42% = \$32,336 City of Santa Barbara - 35.88% = \$28,704 Montecito Water District - 11.50% = \$9,200 Carpinteria Water District - 12.20% = \$9,760

Cachuma Project costs have always been assessed based on each Member Unit's entitlement of Cachuma water. All benefit from the water that flows to your District or City through the Cachuma conveyance facilities, and all benefit from the maintenance and capital improvements carried out by COMB, regardless of where in the system those improvements are made.

The projects proposed to be funded by the COMB bond are critical to COMB's ability to continue to reliably deliver Cachuma water through the SCC conveyance facilities. As you are well aware, substantial engineering design work has already been done, and a great deal of money has already been spent on the 2nd Pipeline and Mission Creek Pipeline projects. Bid packages were

sent out last week for the 2^{nd} Pipeline Project, and the Mission Creek Pipeline Project is ready to be bid. Land access and construction easements have been purchased. There is also \$3.2 million from Prop 50 at risk if the 2^{nd} Pipeline is not constructed. Therefore, I strongly urge the COMB Board and all of the South Coast Member Unit Boards to allow the bond issuance to go forward, and work toward a resolution on the cost sharing issues through a comprehensive analysis of the entire system.

Please be advised that the Carpinteria Valley Water District (CVWD) Board of Directors considered the matter of cost sharing for COMB's proposed 2009 \$16 million bond issue debt service at its regular Board meeting held on July 1, 2009 and requested that I send you this letter.

The Board is unanimously opposed to approving bond issue documents that commit this District to the current cost sharing methodology based on the 1950's Project yield percentages for member agencies. They formally request that the Cachuma Operation & Maintenance Board (COMB) prepare and incorporate a new cost sharing methodology in the proposed bond issue documents that specifically addresses the current varied use of the Cachuma Project facilities by member agencies related to all non-Project water as well as Project water.

The methodology proposed in the attached memo dated June 2, 2009 from me to CVWD's Rate & Budget Committee is recommended as the best and most easily implemented methodology. It would address both differing agency use of Cachuma capacity for non-Project water similar to the Bureau's Warren Act arrangement and allow the application of year-end credits and debits in much the way that the Central Coast Water Authority handles adjustments.

Recommendation:

Recommend to full Board that this District formally request of COMB that a new methodology, described below, be used by COMB to address cost sharing of the **debt service for the proposed 2009 \$16 million bond issue** by COMB. This methodology is as follows:

Each year, for the \$16 million bond issue, the amount of debt service (~\$1,100,000) based on the old Cachuma entitlement percentages (Goleta 40.42%; Santa Barbara 35.89%; Carpinteria 12.2%; Montecito 11.5%) paid by the four South coast agencies is to be adjusted by a usage based calculation. The difference of the two will result in an annual adjustment in the form of a credit or debit to the following year's debt service payment obligation.

For example, using FY 07-08 actual usage numbers (see attached Table 2) the City of Santa Barbara's cost share of \$394,793 (using the old Cachuma entitlement percentage - 35.89% of \$1.1 million) would be adjusted based on total actual usage cost total of \$389,056, calculated below:

\$1.1 million (annual debt service) / 32,672 AF (total all agency usage) = \$33.67/AF. \$33.67 AF x 11,555 AF (total Santa Barbara usage) = \$389,056.

Santa Barbara would then receive a credit of \$5,736 applied to the next year's debt service payment, as follows: \$394,793 - \$389,056 = \$5,736.

Following this methodology for other agencies, Montecito would be debited \$26,853; Carpinteria credited for \$30,806; and Goleta credited for \$8,998. La Cumbre would contribute \$17,744.

Background:

- 1) Existing costs for the maintenance of the COMB facilities are fixed and based on entitlement allocations derived when the Cachuma Project was constructed in the 1950s;
- 2) There are, however, new realities of water use through Cachuma facilities, including:
 - a. New sources of water supply, most notably imported State Water;
 - b. Other agencies, not COMB members, utilize Project facilities and do not pay for system maintenance and improvements.

The following Table 1 illustrates Cachuma and State Water allocations for all South Coast water agencies; Table 2 illustrates all water use for FY 2007-08.

Please be advised that the Carpinteria Valley Water District Board of Directors took action at its special Board meeting held on June 2, 2009 to formally request that the Cachuma Operation & Maintenance Board (COMB) prepare a new cost sharing methodology, not based solely on the 1950's Project yield percentages, for consideration by COMB for COMB's proposed 2009 \$16 million bond issue debt service.

The CVWD Board is not specifically requesting that the cost sharing methodology outlined in the attached memo dated June 2, 2009 from me to CVWD's Rate & Budget Committee be utilized. It may however, with some possible modifications, be the best and most easily implemented methodology. Other methodologies that may emerge in this effort should certainly be considered if they capture the reality of the new and different uses of the proposed new COMB owned Project facilities.

As much as it would have been a good idea to approach the cost sharing questions for the bond issue debt service as part of a comprehensive review of cost sharing for the Cachuma Project as whole, perhaps in conjunction with acquisitions from the Bureau, I do not see an effort that large occurring in the short time frame remaining before the bond issue documents are now scheduled to go before the four south coast agency boards of approval. Perhaps what is done now for the new COMB owned projects will serve as a model for some future Cachuma Project cost sharing agreement.

I am sure you appreciate that decisions by elected boards relative to long term debt obligations require their full understanding and consent, and that it is my duty as CVWD's General Manager to ensure that CVWD's Directors are fully informed and prepared for such a decision as is going forward at COMB. I look forward to working with you to make this happen.

Proceedings

The meeting began at 9:07 and was called to order by Matt Naftaly. There was no public comment and the meeting minutes for the May 11, 2009 meeting were approved. Mr. Naftaly turned the meeting over to Tom Fayram who spoke about leadership on Prop 84 and Kevin Walsh's absence due to family emergencies. Mr. Fayram said that the Water Agency was in contact with Kevin and that they would keep the Partners up to date on potential future leadership issues.

Mr. Naftaly then discussed the outstanding signed MOUs and payments to the County. He also announced that the County would be sending out invoices and also be sending out progress reports to give partners an overview of the process, milestones, goals in the future, and in general, a status update so that partners can report to their governing bodies. Mr. Naftaly also gave the partners a status report on the budget and contract statuses of all consultants working on Prop 84. He noted that there were still funds for Dudek and Kevin Walsh and recommended a contract extension for the services of Kathy Caldwell of CH2MHill. There was a brief discussion about extending the contract and then it was unanimously approved.

Matt Naftaly then discussed the membership of the Steering Committee and the roles and responsibilities associated with committee membership. These responsibilities include providing leadership for the group, taking an active role in guiding policy and decision-making, organizing in sub-regions and conducting outreach. It was explained that the steering committee also included NGOs. There was expressed concern that stakeholders, cooperating partners and

NGOs were not well defined in the MOU and it was requested that these terms be clearly defined. There was also concern expressed about what NGOs were and how they were organized. It was agreed that there would be follow-up on this topic. Further, there was discussion on updating the MOU.

Mr. Naftaly asked Ms. Gray to discuss the timeline for the Expedited Round of Prop 84. Ms. Caldwell also addressed this topic of expedited funding. A question was raised as to the status of Prop 84 funds and the status of Prop 50 funds. Lee Moldaver spoke about his impressions of the State's funding crisis and how they may proceed forward. A conversation then ensued regarding the amount of money available in the expedited round. Ms. Ramaker indicated that Casmalia was interested in seeking funding in the expedited round and explained the project that Casmalia CSD was interested in having funded. Ms. Ramaker also stated that the City of Lompoc was interested in the expedited round and had a project. Mr. Barget explained what the project would be. In response, many agencies began explaining their potential projects for funding. These included projects from: 1) CCWA.; 2) CCRB and potential partnership with South Coast Habitat Restoration; 3) Goleta Water District; 4) Goleta Sanitary District; 5) City of Santa Maria; 6) Summerland Sanitary District; 7) City of Goleta; 8) City of Santa Barbara; and 9) Santa Barbara County Flood Control. A large group discussion followed regarding the possibility and advisability of seeking funding under the expedited round. Mr. McFarland brought up the topic of talking with other regions in the funding area and coordinating with these entities toward potentially making an agreement and sharing the amount allocated for the region. Ms. Caldwell addressed this by stating that there had been precedent for such agreements. She also touched on the types of projects that were being targeted for Prop 84 funding and about how important the selection process was. In addition, she also mentioned that projects being proposed would need to be fully articulated and well thought through in order to be considered. She suggested that in the coming meetings that the group come to consensus on the tool or method for project selection and also suggested a mock project selection process.

Mr. Naftaly spoke about the recent meeting that members of the steering committee, consultants and the water agency had to discuss potential projects in the Rincon Creek Watershed and in collaboration efforts in the future.

Ms. Caldwell gave a brief presentation of the power point presentation that was being drafted for the interview with DWR. Mr. Naftaly announced that the RAP Interview questions from DWR would be circulated to everyone and that everyone could comment on them. It was also decided that the next meeting would be July 23, 2009 in the afternoon at CCWA in Buellton and that there would be a steering committee meeting prior to that.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:05.

Letter of Intent to Coordinate Across IRWM Regions

Dear Tracie:

This letter is in response to DWR's request for clarification on how our respective Regions will work together in the future with regard to management of the Cuyama Watershed located in San Luis Obispo, Santa Barbara, and Ventura Counties. In addition, the concepts addressed herein apply to the Rincon Creek Watershed which is located in Santa Barbara and Ventura Counties and with which only Santa Barbara County and Watersheds Coalition of Ventura County (WCVC) are concerned.

The Santa Barbara County, San Luis Obispo County, and WCVC IRWM Regions were each formed for the purpose of developing and implementing Integrated Regional Water Management Plans. After careful consideration of all boundary options for successful IRWM efforts, the boundaries of these three Regions are primarily delineated along county lines. The three Counties, now IRWM Regions, have been working together in this Tri-County area for a number of years to address fisheries issues, collaborate on water use efficiency projects, and resolve water quality and water rights issues. We have established and continued these collaborative efforts even though the WCVC Region lies within a different Regional Water Quality Control Board region and a different Proposition 84 funding area from the Santa Barbara and San Luis Obispo IRWM Regions.

We appreciate this opportunity to provide clarification about the relationship between our three IRWM Regions as it relates to the ongoing management of the shared Watersheds. We recognize that the overall health of the Watersheds and the need for effective watershed planning are important. The Cuyama Watershed is a large Watershed that spans four counties, including small areas of Kern County, and we have been working together to ensure effective future management of the Watershed. Although Rincon Creek Watershed is much smaller, similar planning and collaborative efforts have been ongoing between Santa Barbara County and WCVC.

We wish to reinforce our intent to continue working together cooperatively for the best interests of the Cuyama and Rincon Watersheds by developing watershed-based goals, priorities, programs, and projects that address critical needs within the Watersheds. Additionally we will continue to meet and identify new opportunities to work together on studies, projects, and programs that will enhance the health of the Watersheds and, in the case of the Cuyama Watershed, the underlying Cuyama Groundwater Basin. We will coordinate our respective IRWM Plans to address management of our shared resources.
